Health and Safety Policy Statement

- 1. The health and safety of our members, volunteers and spectators (if any) is of paramount importance.
- 2. The Club follows the England Netball *Rules of Netball* which are framed with safety in mind. The Club also adheres to the England Netball Safeguarding Policy and current guidance on Covid.
- 3. Level 2 Coaches all hold a current Emergency First Aid at Work qualification. Other coaches are encouraged to have the same qualification.
- 4. An up-to-date first aid kit is brought to all training sessions and matches.
- 5. Applicants for membership are asked to disclose any health issues that may affect them as netballers. These details are held securely and made available to Coaches and the Safeguarding Officer.
- 6. All players and parents are required to sign up to appropriate codes of conduct.
- 7. Before any session the Lead Coach will perform a risk assessment (which may be informal) of the facility, looking for such risks as debris or trip hazards. The Lead Coach will ensure that any risks are eliminated or mitigated.
- 8. All training sessions are held under the supervision of a Level 2 Coach.
- 9. Players are instructed to wear netball trainers to minimise the risk of ankle and knee injury.
- 10. Players wear club kit at matches and Club T-shirts at training. Coaches set a good example by wearing identifiable and appropriate clothing in club colours.
- 11. During netball activities no jewellery is worn, and nails are cut short so that they are not visible from the palm of the hand
- 12. All netball activities commence with a warm-up session to promote core strength and conditioning and to reduce the risk of strains.
- 13. [Added at AGM on 12.10.2022] In the event of a player being unable to continue playing as a result of an injury or becoming unwell, a first aider should be called to attend. The first aider and coach or team manager should determine which action(s) should be taken:
 - call for an ambulance
 - obtain access to a defibrillator if necessary
 - administer first aid for injury in accordance with guidelines communicated in Emergency First Aid at Work training
 - call the player's parent or alternative contact to get the player picked up and taken home or to A&E. A responsible adult should remain with the player until her care can be handed over to a paramedic, parent or designated alternative contact.
